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# MONTROSE COUNTY FAIR OPEN SHOW RULES

#### **ENTRY RULES:**

- 1. All open division entries are \$1.00 per entry.
- Entry forms are available prior to the Fair in the Montrose Extension Office. Exhibits
  must be entered in the name of the owner of the maker of living art and art show items
  and maker/producer of crops and floriculture. Maker of crop exhibits should list the
  producer's name.
- Open show entries will be taken on Saturday, July 19 from 9:00am to 5:00pm and Sunday, July 20 from 9:00am to 5:00pm at the Event Center.
- 4. Open Show Flower and Food Entry Dropoff will be Monday, July 21 from 7:00am to9:00am at the Event Center.
- 5. All open exhibitors should obtain an exhibitor number before completing entries. This exhibitor number will be used on all open entries.

#### **GENERAL RULES:**

- 1. No exhibits of inferior quality will be eligible to receive awards.
- No exhibitor may receive more than two placing in any one class, excluding the Art Show.
- 3. Judges are required to select only one first place exhibit per class.
- 4. Agricultural exhibits must be a current season crop unless otherwise specified.
- 5. Montrose County, Montrose County Fair Board members and Superintendents are not responsible for the loss or damage to any animal or article in the Fair.
- Exhibit Hall will be closed to the public from 9am until judging is over on judging day Monday 9:00am – 6:00pm.
- 7. Open show entries must remain in place until 8:00am on Sunday, July 27 2025.
- Open show entries must be picked up Sunday July 27 between 8:00 AM and Noon. Fair entries left over will be disposed of.
- 9. Exhibitors in the Montrose County 4-H and FFA classes will be eligible to compete in open breeding classes. Animals shown in Junior Division market classes may not be

shown in Open Division classes.

- 10. Where Youth open classes are provided exhibitors must be 18 years of age or under as of January 1st of the current year.
- 11. Youth open class exhibitors will not be eligible to compete in regular open classes with the same exhibit.
- 12. Youth open exhibitors may enter regular open classes only when there are no other entries in the Youth class.
- 13. New classes can be created on entry day with the approval of four Fair Board members.
- 14. Classes will be divided on judging day only when the judge requests the division and the Superintendent supports the division.
- 15. Division Superintendents reserve the right to cancel or combine any class due to lack of entries.
- In the event of an emergency the Superintendent will contact no more than two Fair Board members for guidance.
- 17. The Superintendent shall rule on proper classification of exhibits. No changes in classification will be made at time of judging unless approved by the Superintendent.
- 18. Placing will be 1st place through 4th place.
- 19. Premiums will be paid as follows 1st place \$3, 2nd place \$2 and 3rd place \$1.
- 20. All premiums must be picked up within 30 days of the close of Fair.

#### **SAFETY RULES:**

- 1. Fair Board members, Montrose County staff and Superintendents have the authority to enforce all safety rules.
- 2. Bicycles are not allowed in Friendship Hall, the Event Center, or the livestock barns.
- No dogs, cats or other pets are allowed on fairground's property unless they are entered in a fair class or participating in a fair event and then are only allowed during their respective show. Service animals are allowed.
- No distracting or startling toys, noisemakers or balloons are allowed on fair grounds property.
- 5. Rowdy and unsafe play is not permitted.

- 6. No climbing in or on any building.
- 7. Water fights are not permitted at any time on fairground's property.
- Any activity deemed unsafe by a Fair Board member or Superintendent shall stop immediately upon request or that member will be disqualified and asked to leave the Fairgrounds immediately.

#### **OBJECTION RULE:**

All Complaints must be submitted in writing, and must be signed and dated by the complainant, accompanied with a \$75 cash deposit. All complaints will be examined within 24 business hours by a representative from the Montrose County Attorney's office, and a written ruling will issue. If the complaint is sustained, the deposit will be returned to the complainant. If the complaint is found to be without merit, the deposit is forfeited. All decisions are final.

- Open show entries will be taken on Saturday, July 19 from 9:00am to 5:00pm and Sunday, July 20 from 9:00am to 5:00pm at the Event Center.
- 5. Judging will begin at 9:00am on Monday July 21.
- 6. Exhibits must remain in place until Sunday, July 27 at 8:00 AM.
- Exhibits must be picked up Sunday July 27 between 8:00 AM and Noon the Event Center. Fair entries left over will be disposed of.
- 8. Flowers will be judged on condition and quality.
- Arrangements that follow a theme or title should have the title stated on the arrangement.
- 10. No artificial plants are permitted in arrangement. Figurines, birds, butterflies, natural filler, fruit, vegetables and ribbons are permitted.
- 11. No cans are allowed
- 12. Roses should be of exhibition form. Higher center, generally 1/2 to 3/4 open.
- 13. Containers are only judged in arrangement classes
- 14. Premiums: 1st- \$3; 2nd- \$2; 3rd- \$1

#### **HELPFUL HINTS**

Cut in the morning or evening, at an angle using a sharp knife and place in warm water for 2 hours or overnight.

Flowers that wilt easily should be collected the morning of the show.

All specimens should be clean, and free from insect and disease damage or other blemishes.

#### RULES:

- 1. All Open Show rules apply.
- 2. The Floriculture Open Show is for amateurs only
- 3. Exhibitors that do not follow the class description will be disqualified. Flowers must remain in the class in which they were entered. Exhibits may be reclassified during judging if the judge requests the reclassification and the Superintendent supports it.
- 4. Open show entries will be taken on Saturday, July 19 from 9:00am to 5:00pm and Sunday, July 20 from 9:00am to 5:00pm at the **Event Center.**
- 5. Judging will begin at 9:00am on Monday July 21.
- 6. Exhibits must remain in place until Sunday, July 27 at 8:00 AM.
- Exhibits must be picked up Sunday July 27 between 8:00 AM and Noon the Event Center. Fair entries left over will be disposed of.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to observe and ask a reasonable number of questions during judging.
- Exhibitors are not allowed to make comments with regards to how the judge is judging.
   If comments are made, that exhibitor and his/her entries will be disqualified.
- 10. Food Art Class: Follow a theme or title should have the title stated on the arrangement. No artificial plants are permitted in arrangement. Figurines, plastic eyes, birds, butterflies, natural filler, fruit, vegetables and ribbons are permitted.

#### **HELPFUL HINTS**

The petiole is a stalk that connects the blade with the leaf base.

- o Beans
- Color should be bright, seeds should be small, and the flesh should not have any voids. Pods should be uniform in shape with stems attached.
- Beets (table)
  - Beet should be tender, smooth, free of side roots, have a small crown, and should be rounded, symmetrical and uniform. The root should not be removed.

Size from 1" to 3.5" diameter.

- Cabbage
  - Heads should be firm and solid with 2 to 3 wrapper leaves per head and small mid-veins, tightly formed. Stems should be cut 1/4" below the head.
- Carrots
  - Carrots should be small cored, straight, crisp and have deep color. The root should be clean and free of side roots. The skin should be smooth, the roots uniform and true to size and shape for variety. Avoid large crowns and green shoulders.
- Cauliflower
  - One head at least 4" in diameter with 4 to 6 leaves to protect curd. Trim outer leaves slightly above head. The curd should be pure white, smooth, and compact. Avoid over maturity and openness. Stem should be trimmed 1/2" below the last remaining leaf.
- Eggplant
  - Fruit should retain calyx cap and 1/2" of stem. A good quality eggplant is firm, heavy in relation to size, with a uniform color and small blossom scars. Should not be washed, but it should be cleaned with a soft cloth.
- Garlic
  - Uniform, well-shaped and full sized. Brush off dirt, do not wash. Do not remove sheath. Cut off roots. Bulbs should have small well-dried necks. I.
- Green Onions
  - 1/2" to 1" in diameter, clean, purple or white color, with dark green tops about
     6" long. Remove loose skin, cut tops to 4" to 5" above white shank. The shanks should be long, straight and the bulb not enlarged. Peel only one outer rapper. Trim roots to 1/2".
- Peas
  - Pods should be plump and firm and seeds sweet and tender with approx. 2 inch stems.

- Pepper (mild/hot)
  - 1/2" of stem should be attached. Fruit should be clean and firm with dark color (red, green, or yellow) and without blemishes. The peppers should be of uniform size, color, and number of lobes.
- Potatoes
  - Red: Firm, plump and no damage spots. Potatoes should be uniform with shallow eyes, and smooth surface. Brush off soil with soft brush. Do not wash.
- Radishes
  - Should be smooth, firm, and crisp. Followed by uniform, shape, color, and maturity.
- Tomatoes
  - Green Should be uniform, firm and "mature green" with a slight pinkish color preferred to being green. Should be soil-free, but not washed or polished.
  - Ripe Fruit should be uniform in size, color, firmness and mature. The interior bright and meaty with green gel around seeds. Tomatoes should be true to variety in size, shape, and color. The skins should be smooth and without growth cracks. Should be soil-free, but not washed or polished. Cherry - Fruit should be uniform in size, color, firmness, and maturity. Tomatoes should be true to variety in size, shape, color, and maturity.

#### FOOD PRESERVATION

#### **RULES:**

- 1. All Open Show and Living Arts rules apply.
- 2. Two entries per class are allowed.
- 3. Food preservation guidelines must be Colorado State University or USDA approved.
- 4. All jars and lids must be home standard canning jars and lids either half pint, pint or quart only.
- 5. All jars should be clean and not sticky.
- 6. All entries must be labeled on the side of the jar with:
  - a. Date Preserved (within last year)
  - b. Name of Product
  - c. Altitude
  - d. Hot or Cold Pack
  - e. Time Processed
  - f. Method of Processing (Hot water bath/pressure canner-pounds of pressure)
- 7. Hot and spicy entries should be identified.
- 8. No decorative additions on the entries.
- 9. Recipes must be included with entry. Indicate class number on the recipe.
- 10. Canned fruits and vegetables will not be opened but will be judged on appearance in the jar. Other canned and preserved items will be open/or tasted at the judges discretion.

- 5. One bottle per entry is required for Wine and Spirits, and 2 bottles per entry for Beer,
- 6. Bottles must be 10oz for beer and 375ml for wines or spirits.
- 7. Grolsch style swing caps are accepted.
- 8. Three beer entries per class are allowed if the style varies between entries.
- 9. Beer style should be specified and beers will be evaluated per BJCP guidelines.
- 10. Judges may disqualify entries if they are determined to be unworthy.

- 4. All artwork must be original.
- 5. An artist must enter his or her work in the correct division. Any work in question will be placed in the correct division by the Superintendent.
- 6. All artwork must be done within the last year. (The day after the last day of MCFR up until the first day of the following year's fair.).
- 7. An artist is allowed a maximum of 2 works in each class. Black and white photography class may have a maximum of 3 works per artist.
- 8. An artwork can be shown at the Montrose County Fair once.
- All artwork must be matted and/ or framed / presented in such a way that the art can be safely moved and hung.
- 10. All artwork must be prepared for secure and straight hanging on peg board. All hanging work must have arched wire, strong string hanger or large enough of a single loop to catch a hook.
- 11. Name, address and phone number shall be listed on the back of each artwork.
- 12. Articles classified as handcrafts or woodcrafts are to be entered in Living Arts and Wood Working Divisions.
- 13. The minimum size for photographs is 5"x7". Smaller photographs will NOT be accepted.
- 14. Miniatures can be done in any painting medium. The maximum size is 5"x7".
- 15. No early removal of entries.
- 16. All items made out of wood will be judged in Division NN Wood Craft. All hand-crafted

items will be judged in Division LL - Living Arts (i.e. painted gourds).

- 17. Student division artwork must be 24" x 48" maximum.
- 18. Color and black and white photography classes will be combined if entries do not meet or exceed 4 entries per class.
